

CAIDP Statement on the

OECD Declaration on a Trusted, Sustainable and Inclusive Digital Future  
(Gran Canaria 2022)

The [Center for AI and Digital Policy](#) supports the **Declaration on a Trusted, Sustainable and Inclusive Digital Future** (Gran Canaria 2022) of the [OECD - OCDE](#) and [OECD.AI](#) and specifically calls attention to:

- 1) The commitment of the OECD to "Advancing a human-centric and rights-oriented digital transformation that includes promoting the enjoyment of human rights, both offline and online, strong protections for personal data, laws and regulation fit for the digital age, and trustworthy, secure, responsible and sustainable use of emerging digital technologies and artificial intelligence."
- 2) The call of the OECD to enhance understanding of the impact of AI on labour market and employment prospects,
- 3) The call of the OECD to support the "development of forward-looking, coherent and implementable frameworks for governing artificial intelligence and managing its risks effectively; and provide evidence, foresight, tools and incident monitoring for effective policy planning and execution to implement trustworthy artificial intelligence."

We also support the OECD's commitment to "respect for the rule of law, human rights, and democratic values." We share your vision for a human-centric, rights-oriented digital transformation.

Given the growing importance of the digital future, we now urge greater attention by the OECD and the member states to the implementation of the OECD principles that were specifically adopted in response to the emergence of digital technologies.

We call your attention to the specific provisions of the **OECD Privacy Guidelines** (1980):

1. Collection Limitation
2. Data Quality
3. Individual Participation
4. Purpose Specification
5. Use Limitation
6. Security Safeguards (OECD Privacy Guidelines)
7. Openness
8. Accountability

We also call your attention to the **OECD AI Principles** (2019):

1. Inclusive growth, sustainable development and well-being
2. Human-centered values and fairness
3. Transparency and explainability
4. Robustness, security, and safety
5. Accountability

These Principles are previous commitments of the OECD and the member states to establish the human-centric, rights-oriented digital transformation as set out in the Gran Canaria Declaration.

*It is absolutely vital that the OECD begin work on the application of these foundational principles, developed and endorsed by the OECD, to the world of AI.*
